### A Message from Mrs Rought



It doesn't seem five minutes since we were returning to school after Christmas and now it is time to break up for February half term - time really does fly!

We have enjoyed another fantastic half term, with lots of activities going on to enthuse and motivate the children. In the School Development section below, I have outlined some of the many improvements we have made so far and have shared a little about what else we have to do - it is certainly a busy year and I am so grateful to work with such dedicated staff, who work so hard. I hope that as parents, you have noticed the improvements that have been made. I hope that you were happy with your child's progress report and the opportunity to discuss at our parents evenings that were held this week.

Next half term will be a busy one, with lots of events to look forward to. I cannot wait to launch the St Martin's Super 7 with the children on Tuesday 25th February, when we will all dress up as Superheroes and will learn about our first Inspirational Individual. We also have visits about road safety, we have eco workshops, Edgmond residential, railway safety assemblies, Comic Relief, Mothers' Day events and Easter events - so please see the dates section and keep an eye on Class Dojo for all the information you need.

World Book day this year will be a little different, we are asking that children wear their pyjamas for the day, rather than parents having the pressure of a costume, lets face it, the shops are making a profit out of what should be a celebration of books and reading. Mrs Moore sent out a letter with details of when you can pop in to share a book with your child,

this is on our website and Dojo, so please take a look and let us know if you are attending via the link in the letter.

Over half term we are setting some reading activities, the first being Extreme Reading. Extreme reading is all about reading in unconventional or surprising locations or situations. Books can be enjoyed anytime, anywhere — whether you're upside down on a sofa, perched in a tree, or balancing on a beam! Please find somewhere unusual (and safe) to read, take a photo and send it via dojo to your child's class teacher. We can then print it and make a display in school of all our reading adventures!

The second is a 'Book in a Box' competition. Children can make a mini scene in a box (a shoe box is perfect) from any story they choose, using items that have been recycled or reused. It could be any book at all, including one they have enjoyed in school. They can use their imaginations and be as creative as they like! Completed boxes to be brought back after the half term break- there are some pictures of examples in the letter.

We also have the Book Fair back, the children asked and we delivered - we will send details of how you can access it after half term, the children will have their £1 World Book Day voucher to put towards a book they like.

I wish you all a wonderful half term and look forward to welcoming you all back on Tuesday 25th February - remember the 24th February is a staff training day.

### School Development



As you know, our school development is linked to three main areas - Motivation, Achievement and Pride (M.A.P). Below are some of the things we have done to work on our areas of focus for this year. We still have a lot to do, but we are proud of where we are and are confident that we will achieve our targets by the end of the year.

#### Motivation

After half term we are launching our St Martin's Super 7 and we cannot wait! The Super 7 represent the character strengths we wish to develop in our children. We will do this

through our curriculum and also through special events, such as our Inspirational Individuals and career talks.

We are holding our launch event on Tuesday 25th February and are asking staff and pupils to dress up as superheroes for the day. They will be introduced to the Super 7 in a special assembly and then they will learn about their first Inspirational Individual who are:

Years 1 and 2 - Lenny Henry

Years 3 and 4 - Malala Yousafzai

Years 5 and 6 - The Three Degrees (WBA)

There will be two more Inspirational Individuals researched this year, the children will also relate the Super 7 to their class reading books as we discuss the characters in them

Our music offer is improving, we now have weekly trumpet lessons in year 3, year 4 will access this in the summer term. We have our weekly music style or composer, so children are exposed to a wide range of music and we enjoy listening together and discussing what we like and dislike. Our weekly 'Who Chose that Tune?' is a really highlight, the children are always fascinated by the staff member's choice and why they love that song. After Easter we will start an after school choir, in the hope of joining Young Voices next year, a huge event at Pulse Arena (the old NEC).

#### **Achievement**

We are working with a maths consultant who is supporting us to improve our maths curriculum even further, she came to visit this half term and was really impressed with what she saw and the next steps she has given us are well under way.

We work hard to enhance the curriculum with experiences, such as the year 4 whale rescue visit, our history workshops, author events and other events. These really do impact positively on the children's outcomes.

The children are working hard on their handwriting and leaders are ensuring that kinetic letters are taught well across school. years 4, 5 and 6 have all been given a pen, with the aim of giving them more motivation to write as neatly as they can, this really has resulted in better outcomes.

Leaders continue to monitor and check on lessons, look at books and by speak to children, so that we can gauge where we need to improve. The team we have are so dedicated to improving teaching and learning for our children, I am so proud of their hard work.

#### Pride

We continue to have high expectations of our children in terms of uniform, so thankyou for your support with this. Our attendance and punctuality has also been a focus, as a result St Martin's have the highest attendance and lowest rates of persistent absence in Tipton.

We have big plans for our outdoor environment, once the weather improves we intend to brighten up the wood work, create play zones and calm areas. We are also looking at options for an outdoor library - these are exciting times and we will use some of the money we raised at the Summer and Christmas Fairs to fund the improvements. We may also need some parent volunteers to help out on the odd weekend or school holiday date, so that we can do works when the children are no here - watch this space!



### Hello and Goodbye

In January we welcomed Mrs Harris to our teaching team, who is currently teaching in year 2. Mrs Harris has settled into St Martin's life already and is enjoying working with her new class. We have also welcomed three new lunchtime staff, Miss Smith, Miss Ward and Miss Pugh, who are all now settled into their new roles.

You may have been wondering where Mrs Pilsbury has been, unfortunately she has been unwell and has decided to retire. Mrs Pilsbury has worked at St Martins for over 20 years, so we will be celebrating her retirement with her after half term with the children. I am sure you will join me in wishing her all the best for a happy, healthy retirement.

Sadly we also said goodbye to Mrs Ward from our lunchtime team, she found a job that could offer her more hours, so although we were sad to see her go, we were thrilled for her and wish her well in her new role.

Mrs Hood is returning after half term following her surgery, we are thrilled to have her back and have missed her! I know that the Nursery children can't wait to see her back in class.

### Our Collective Worship

13th January - The Creation


20th January - Adam and Eve

They ran the farm competition last year (that we won!) Faye came to help us harvest the potatoes that we planted in October, and helped us make them into crisps for our Christmas party! They were delicious. We learned all about different types of potatoes and what they can be used for. We also made some posters that show what we learned. 














### LEAF Visit - Year 4

Year 4 had a visit from Faye Edwards, the Education Induction Manager and Specialist from LEAF (Linking Environment And Farming) to help us with our Geography topic 'Plants of the World' and help us to become Caretakers of the World.

We began by learning about the different types of bulbs, how they grow and their life cycle. We read the instructions about how to plant and care for our bulbs and then we went outside to give our outdoor area a bit of a lift! We planted so many bulbs ready for the spring, although we did have to make sure that the bulbs were the right way up. We also gave the outdoor area a makeover! We collected all of the dead leaves off the floor, swept up and tidied up the area and now it looks great!







#### British Divers Marine Life Rescue - Year 4



Year 4 were visited by a medic from the BDMLR (British Divers Marine Life Rescue) who taught them how to save a marine animal (whale and a dolphin) using specialised equipment. This was in response to their book Michael Morpurgo's 'This Morning I met a Whale.' about the famous whale who got stuck in the Thames. BDMLR is the charity that helped try to save the whale in the Thames which was watched by over 300 million people around the world. Year 4 also met Mark Stevens, who was the lead diver and he shared lots of great information with them.

### Ancient Egypt Workshop - Year 3



Our Year 3 class had an enriching experience at the Ancient Egyptian workshop. They explored the fascinating people of Ancient Egyptian society, learning about their roles and daily lives. The students examined the timeline of the famed King Tutankhamun, delving into the exciting discovery of his tomb and the treasures within. To top off their morning, they expressed their newfound knowledge and creativity through various activities like voice expressions, movement, role play, and drama, bringing history to life in an engaging and interactive way.

#### PC Visit - Year 6



Year 6 had a visit from PC 7957 Shendy Blakemore who works closely with our school. She came to tell us all about how to stay safe online. We started with a quiz. Their answers highlighted how much they know, but also, how confusing it can be for our children navigating the online world safely.

PC Shendy shared an very enlightening video, showing how easily children can be tricked into sharing personal information that can put them at risk. We had a really interesting discussion about some of the situations the children have run into online and PC Shendy explained how best to handle certain scenarios the children were unsure about.

The children have all signed an 'Internet Safety Pledge', promising to use the internet safely and not to share their personal information. PC Shendy has asked us to share this letter with you, so that you can best support your children's online safety.

If you ask them about what they have learned, I'm sure you will be really impressed!

### PC Visit - Year 5 and Parents/Carers



Year 5 together with some parents and carers kicked off Safer Internet Day with a very informative visit from PC Shendy Blakemore who told us all about how to keep safe on our devices when we are playing games and using social media. It was a great way to start the day and the children learnt lots of new facts that they were keen to discuss when we got back to class.

### Safer Internet Day



The theme of the day was "Too good to be true? Protecting yourself and others from scams online."

Safer Internet Day is celebrated globally in February each year to promote the safe and positive use of digital technology for children and young people, and to inspire a national conversation about using technology responsibly, respectfully, critically, and creatively.

The children took part in activities today related to this, which cover topics such as phishing, personal information, recognizing scams, and critical thinking.

### Athlete Visit - Danny Butler

We had a fantastic afternoon with the mountain bike rider Danny Butler. The children worked very hard during the circuit training exercise and really showed us how determined they are! They also loved watching him perform some of his favourite tricks and talking about his many achievements throughout his career. Thankyou so much for your support in sponsoring the children, we have around £500 to spend on sports equipment.

#### **Spotlight on: Trusted Adults**

#### What are Trusted Adults?

The definition of a "Trusted Adult" is someone who pupils view as a reliable and caring source of support. A trusted adult is someone that a pupil can turn to if they're worried or concerned. This could be in a safeguarding capacity or support for a child's mental health.

Staff at St Martin's work hard to build good relationships with pupils in order to gain the trust required. Being a small, one form entry school means that we know our pupils well. We provide a safe and supportive classroom culture and environment. This sets the tone for trusted relationships between staff and pupils.


All children at St Martin's have at least one trusted adult that they are able to talk to should the need arise. Staff have undergone 'Trusted Adult' training in order to understand how best to meet children's needs if required.

The trusted adult role is vital to ensure that children feel safe both within ad outside of school.

As parents, you may also sometimes need to talk to someone that you are able to trust too. Please contact school if you feel that there is a staff member that you would like to talk to about your child or other issues that may arise for your family. We are always here to help and support your family as well as your child.

All of our staff at St Martin's have regular safeguarding training updates. Safeguarding is also part of our induction programme for new staff. We are very lucky to have a Early Help Police Officer attached to our school. Her name is Shendy Blakemore. She will be working closely with us this year to provide important safeguarding sessions to our children. If you would like to speak to her or feel that you need any support from her then please let Mrs Lees know and we will be happy to arrange that for you. If you are concerned about a child, please talk to a Designated Safeguarding Lead or any member of staff in school.

### Dementia Friendly School



Our 'Dementia Friendly School' work this year. Our links with our local residential home will continue and we will also be looking to widen this. We will be working to achieve the next stage of our award this year.

### **Universal Credit - Managed Migration**

Please see attached information regarding Universal Credit and Managed Migration which will affect a number of residents within Sandwell.



#### Universal Credit - Managed Migration

Universal Credit is a working-age benefit which brings together the following six legacy benefits into one benefit:

- Income based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income based Employment Support Allowance
   Housing Benefit

- Income Support
   Child Tax Credits
   Working Tax Credits

Universal Credit provides support to residents with their daily living and housing costs, it can also help pay for childcare costs. Universal Credit can be claimed by residents in work on a low income, residents who are out of work and residents unable to work. Most people have to make their Universal Credit claim online and claimants are paid a single payment monthly in arrears. #### What is Managed Migration?

The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) have begun the process of moving individuals who claim a legacy benefit onto Universal Credit. This process is known as Managed Migration.

Managed Migration is where the DWP advise you to claim Universal Credit even though your circumstances have not changed. It is important that if you receive a Migration Notice letter from the DWP that you contact the Council for advice. If you fail to claim Universal Credit within three months, then your benefits will end, and you will be left with no

#### Who is affected?

The first group of households affected by Managed Migration in Sandwell are households where working tax or child tax credits are in payment and no other income-related benefit is in payment.

The process of Managed Migration in Sandwell began on 9 February 2024. The timeline below outlines when current legacy benefit customers will be invited to migrate to Universal Credit:



If you only receive ESA or ESA with HB, you will be the final group invited to migrate to Universal Credit. This is likely to be in 2028 though this date may be subject to change.

#### Who can help?

If you are a Council tenant and receive a migration notice, then you should contact the Council's Rents Team on **0121 737 5148** Monday to Thursday 9am – 5.30pm and 9am – 5pm on a Friday. Our Income Recovery Officers can advise you of the best time to claim Universal Credit.

If you are in the Private Rented Sector and receive a migration notice, then you should contact the Council's Welfare Rights Team on  $0121\,569\,3158$ , Monday to Friday 9am  $-4.30 \mu$ m where an advisor will be available to assist you.



### 4 Community Trust - Wraparound Care Provision



Our wrap around care is run by 4 Community Trust, who run many breakfast and after school clubs in the local area, they have a great reputation and are competitively priced. They offer lots of flexibility in how many sessions you need to book, they have an app where you can manage your bookings and payments and they accept childcare vouchers.

The club takes place in our old year 5 room, which was upgraded over the summer. It now has a kitchen area fitted, so that meals can be prepared on site. Parents can access the room without coming onto the main school reception before and after school office hours. This

will be via a bell or a phone call to the staff on duty. If your child gets space in a school run after school club, they can be taken to this club by school staff if needed. Please remember that there is no guarantee of your child gaining a space in a school run after school club each half term, so please do not rely on this for childcare.

In order to book a place you will need to call the number on the flyer below, you will then find out how to register on the app and how to set your child up with access to the wrap around care. As 4 Community Trust is an independent organisation, any queries about booking and payments will need to go through them please, not the main school office.

We really hope that you are pleased with this offer and it makes managing work and the school run that little bit easier.

Can parents and carers please be vigilant when crossing the roads. You are the one who will be with your children at the roadside every day. #### **Operation Encompass**

St Martin's is part of Sandwell's Operation Encompass. This is an initiative that enhances communication between the police and schools where a child is at risk from domestic abuse.

Operation Encompass has been established to help schools provide in-school support to children who have been present at, exposed to or involved in any domestic abuse incident.

We know that children can be significantly harmed, physically and/or emotionally, during these situations, and that it also negatively affects their learning and behaviour in class.

Therefore, as part of the Operation Encompass procedure, and to help mitigate the resulting negative impact, school will now receive a confidential information from West Midlands Police or Children's Services regarding any child or young person has been witness to, or involved in, any reported domestic abuse incident.

Here at St Martin's, we have a dedicated and child-focussed Safeguarding Team. They are specially trained to effectively use the information the Police share, in confidence, and enable the school to provide the right support to any child and their family.

We always endeavour to offer the best support possible to our pupils and believe this will be extremely beneficial for all those involved.
