A Message from Mrs Rought



It doesn't seem five minutes since I wrote to you at the end of the first Spring half term and here we are ready to break up for our Easter end of term holiday.

It has certainly been another busy and exciting half term here at St Martin's, with so many special guests and event days happening. The children have learnt about road safety with Sophie Lounds, how to be safe near a railway by taking part in a nationwide assembly from Network Rail, Years 3 and 4 learnt about air pollution though the Auntie Duck initiative and we took part in the Sustran Big Walk and Wheel! Sandwell Litterwatch have been in a few times, firstly to work with EYFS about recycling, then Years 1 and 2 had seed craft sessions and our Eco Council spent time litter picking around the school site. We have also enjoyed careers talks and author events, which all enhance our curriculum offer.

I hope that you have enjoyed this half term's parent events, we have enjoyed seeing you at the World Book Day event, EYFS Mother's Day Stay and Play, our SEN coffee morning, Rock Steady's Spring concert, Year 3 trumpet performance and most recently for our Easter events where the children sang, read aloud and showed off their Easter bonnets. It has been lovely to see that the children all understand the real meaning of Easter as a celebration of the resurrection of Jesus, as well as the other traditions associated with this time of year.

Next half term is very short, it is actually only 3 weeks and 4 days long, as we have the May Day bank holiday in week 2. Year 6 will sit their SATS tests, which they have been working very hard on, I am sure they do their absolute best, which is all we can ask of them - the

results will be with us in July. They have their Drayton Manor trip to look forward to the week after SATs have finished, as well as the Leavers' Prom!

We have auditions for our very first Talent Show on the afternoon of 15th May, the children are so excited! Please encourage your child to sign up if they want to, we know it is nerve wracking, but we want our children to be confident heroes and resilient warriors, so that they can be proud achievers when they perform.

We have been lucky enough to secure a whole day of first aid training for all of our children, this will take place on Friday 2nd May. The children will be taught how to make a 999 call if someone needs urgent medical help and how to manage someone who needs minor first aid. This will, of course, be age appropriate, but is a lesson that could save someone's life.

The other BIG event for next half term is the 80th Anniversary of VE Day, which we will be marking in style by having a full day of celebrations on Friday 9th May. We ask that the children come dressed in 1940s costumes and bring a plate of food so that we can have our very own street party. We have a professional company visiting us, who will hold a special whole school assembly and then a range of workshops throughout the day.

I hope that you all have a wonderful Easter break with your child and that this wonderful weather stays with us for our two week break. We are all looking forward to welcoming the children back to school on Monday 28th April.

School Development



As you know, our school development is linked to three main areas - Motivation, Achievement and Pride (M.A.P). Below are some of the things we have done to work on our areas of focus for this year. We are proud of where we are and are confident that we will achieve our targets by the end of the year. A number of governors have been in to school to speak with leaders and children about a range of topics and have been impressed with what they have seen.

Motivation

After February half term we launched our St Martin's Super 7! The Super 7 represent the character strengths we wish to develop in our children. We will do this through our curriculum and also through special events, such as our Inspirational Individuals and career talks.

In Spring 2 the children were introduced to their first Inspirational Individuals and they really enjoyed find out out about their lives and what makes them so special. They were:

Years 1 and 2 - Lenny Henry

Years 3 and 4 - Malala Yousafzai

Years 5 and 6 - The Three Degrees (WBA)

We have also had a number of career related visits - a theatre manager, a writer, a doctor, the fire service, a family lawyer.

Years 3and 4 - Stephen Hawking

Years 5 and 6 - Jane Goodall

There will be one more Inspirational Individual researched this year.

Children from years 4-6 went on a residential to Edgmond Hall and had a fantastic time, we have now also secured 60 bookings Ingestre Hall for current years 3-5, which is amazing! Our summer club offering has been very popular with a wider range of clubs open.

Our music offer continues to improve, Year 3 performed their first trumpet concert and now Year 4 are starting to learn. Our Rock Steady bands performed to their parents and the whole school. We have our weekly music style or composer, so children are exposed to a wide range of music and we enjoy listening together and discussing what we like and dislike. Our weekly 'Who Chose that Tune?' is a really highlight, the children are always fascinated by the staff member's choice and why they love that song. We are joining Young Voices 2026 for the first time, with out new choir performing at the Pulse Arena.

Achievement

We are continuing to work with a maths consultant who is supporting us to improve our maths curriculum even further, she has supported teachers and has led a staff meeting.

The children are still working hard on their handwriting and leaders are ensuring that kinetic letters are taught well across school. They are always very proud of the improvements they have made when they look back at their first page from September.

Leaders continue to monitor and check on lessons, look at books and by speak to children, so that we can gauge where we need to improve. We have also welcomed visits from our governors and our school improvement advisor, who have been very impressed by what they have seen, The team we have are so dedicated to improving teaching and learning for our children, I am so proud of their hard work.

Pride

We continue to have high expectations of our children in terms of uniform, so thankyou for your support with this. Our attendance and punctuality has also been a focus, as a result St Martin's have the highest attendance and lowest rates of persistent absence in Tipton.

We have started to improve our lunchtime activity offer, working with our school council. There are now opportunities for the children to dance, play games, be arty and mix together. Mrs Rought and Mrs Lees went to visit another school last week to gain even more ideas - so watch this space!

We have big plans for our outdoor environment in the summer term, once the weather improves we intend to brighten up the wood work, create play zones and calm areas. We are also looking at options for an outdoor library - these are exciting times and we will use some of the money we raised at the Summer and Christmas Fairs to fund the improvements. We may also need some parent volunteers to help out on the odd weekend or school holiday date, so that we can do works when the children are no here - watch this space!

Road Safety



We had the lovely Sophie Lounds visit us to talk to us about Road Safety. In the session for ye ars 4, 5 and 6 we learned a lot.

- How to cross the road safely -Stop, Look, Listen and THINK
- Booster seats are needed to up 135cm tall
- Escooters are illegal on public land unless you have a driving licence and insurance.
 We found out you can't buy insurance for an Escooter, so they can only be used on private property.

We talked a lot about how to cross the road safely with Sheila, our lolly pop lady. Did you kn ow she has been doing her job for 37 years? Sophie said she is the best in Sandwell and we definitely agree!

She also said that she visits all 123 schools in Sandwell, and our children are the most respec tful she has seen! We are so very proud of them!

Air Pollution - Auntie Duck



We were visited by Tina from Sandwell Council to read us a story about Auntie Duck who taught us some very important messages about air pollution and what we can do to help reduce this. This links to our Big Walk and Wheel event and having as many people walk to school as possible. We did some activities about air pollution, linking to our conservation topic in Science. Later, we will be making an air pollution capture device to help us monitor how much air pollution there is around us. We will share those with you too!

He has led an exciting life! He also shared some amazing classic science fiction stories with them too. Safeguarding



At St Martin's we take our safeguarding duty very seriously. Safeguarding children is the action we take to promote the welfare of children and protect them from harm. Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. Every single person who comes into contact with children and families has a role to play. If you have any concerns about a child's safety or welfare you can speak to a member of our safeguarding team.

Spotlight on: Bullying

Bullying: What is it?

There is no legal definition of bullying, but the Department for Education (DfE) defines bullying as behaviour by an individual or group, repeated over time, that is intended to hurt or harm another individual or group, either physically or emotionally. Bullying is often aimed at certain groups, for example because of their race, religion, gender or sexual orientation. The rapid proliferation of new technologies has provided a new medium for bullying, in the form of cyberbulling through social media, gaming, and text messages.

Bullying can be direct (either physical or verbal) or in direct (for example, being ignored or not spoken to). It results in pain and distress to the victim. Bullying is the systematic and persistent use of aggression with the intention of hurting another person. Bullying can take many forms:

Physical Bullying

Physical bullying occurs when children use physical actions to gain power and control over their peers. Examples of physical bullying include kicking, hitting, punching, slapping, shoving, and other physical attacks.

Verbal Bullying

Perpetrators of verbal bullying use words, statements, and name-calling to gain power and control over their peers. Typically, verbal bullies will use relentless insults to belittle, demean, and hurt another person.

Homophobic Bullying

Homophobic bullying is when people behave or speak in a way which makes someone feel bullied because of their actual or perceived sexuality.

Racist Bullying

This refers to a range of hurtful behaviour, both physical and psychological, that make the person feel unwelcome marginalised and excluded, powerless or worthless because of their colour, ethnicity culture, faith community, national origin or national status.

Cyber-Bullying

Cyber bullying uses digital technologies such as computers and smartphones, and software such as social media, texts, websites and other ne platforms. Cyber bullying can happen at any time. It can be in public or in private.

Bullying Vs Falling Out

There is a difference between bullying and the 'falling out' that children can experience in school. Often issues can be very easily resolved, and with adult intervention, friendships can be restored. Falling out with peers and one off incidents between children are inevitable in all schools. Such issues will not be regarded as 'bullying' by school and are dealt with using a problem solving and restorative approach so that they can be quickly resolved.


It is vital that both children and parents can identify the difference between bullying and common issues that can occur between children in school. Before concluding that your child is being bullied, it is important to establish the full facts by speaking to your child's teacher or a member of the senior leadership team.

Preventing Bullying

Preventing and raising awareness of bullying is essential to keeping incidents in our school to a minimum. Through assemblies as well as PSHE lessons (following the Jigsaw Programme), pupils are given regular opportunities to discuss what bullying is, as well as incidents we would not describe as bullying, such as two friends falling out, or a one-off argument. Pupils are taught to tell an adult in school if they are concerned that they or someone they know is being bullied. Where a child feels unable to discuss this with an adult in school, children are invited to record their concerns and place them in their class worry jar or to speak to a Safeguarding Champion. Parents are also encouraged to contact school if they have concerns about bullying.

All of our staff at St Martin's have regular safeguarding training updates. Safeguarding is also part of our induction programme for new staff. We are very lucky to have a Early Help Police Officer attached to our school. Her name is Shendy Blakemore. She will be working closely with us this year to provide important safeguarding sessions to our children. If you would like to speak to her or feel that you need any support from her then please let Mrs Lees know and we will be happy to arrange that for you. If you are concerned about a child, please talk to a Designated Safeguarding Lead or any member of staff in school.

Dementia Friendly School



As the academic year progresses, we are continuing with work associated with our 'Dementia Friendly School' award.

Our links with our local residential home continue and we are also looking to continue to widen this. We will be working to achieve the next stage of our award this year.

The Alzheimer's Society has information about dementia for teenagers and young adults, and for children, including videos. Some young people have found it helpful to learn more about dementia by becoming a dementia friend. Dementia can be a difficult concept to explain to children - but there are some really great resources to help you to support your own child at home.

Universal Credit - Managed Migration

Please see attached information regarding Universal Credit and Managed Migration which will affect a number of residents within Sandwell.



Universal Credit - Managed Migration

Universal Credit is a working-age benefit which brings together the following six legacy benefits into one benefit:

- Income based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income based Employment Support Allowance
- Housing Benefit
- Income Support
- Child Tax CreditsWorking Tax Credits

Universal Credit provides support to residents with their daily living and housing costs, it can also help pay for childcare costs. Universal Credit can be claimed by residents in work on a low income, residents who are out of work and residents unable to work. Most people have to make their Universal Credit claim online and claimants are paid a single payment monthly in arrears. What is Managed Migration?

The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) have begun the process of moving individuals who claim a legacy benefit onto Universal Credit. This process is known as Managed Migration.

Managed Migration is where the DWP advise you to claim Universal Credit even though your circumstances have not changed. It is important that if you receive a Migration Notice letter from the DWP that you contact the Council for advice. If you fail to claim Universal Credit within three months, then your benefits will end, and you will be left with no income.

Who is affected

The first group of households affected by Managed Migration in Sandwell are households where working tax or child tax credits are in payment and no other income-related benefit is in payment.

The process of Managed Migration in Sandwell began on 9 February 2024. The timeline below outlines when current legacy benefit customers will be invited to migrate to Universal Credit:



If you only receive ESA or ESA with HB, you will be the final group invited to migrate to Universal Credit. This is likely to be in 2028 though this date may be subject to change.

Who can help

If you are a Council tenant and receive a migration notice, then you should contact the Council's Rents Team on **0121 737 5148** Monday to Thursday 9am – 5.30pm and 9am – 5pm on a Friday. Our Income Recovery Officers can advise you of the best time to claim Universal Credit.

If you are in the Private Rented Sector and receive a migration notice, then you should contact the Council's Welfare Rights Team on **0121 569 3158**, Monday to Friday 9am – 4.30pm where an advisor will be available to assist you.



4 Community Trust - Wraparound Care Provision



Our wrap around care is run by 4 Community Trust, who run many breakfast and after school clubs in the local area, they have a great reputation and are competitively priced. They offer lots of flexibility in how many sessions you need to book, they have an app where you can manage your bookings and payments and they accept childcare vouchers.

The club takes place in our old year 5 room, which was upgraded over the summer. It now has a kitchen area fitted, so that meals can be prepared on site. Parents can access the room without coming onto the main school reception before and after school office hours. This will be via a bell or a phone call to the staff on duty. If your child gets space in a school run after school club, they can be taken to this club by school staff if needed. Please remember that there is no guarantee of your child gaining a space in a school run after school club each half term, so please do not rely on this for childcare.

In order to book a place you will need to call the number on the flyer below, you will then find out how to register on the app and how to set your child up with access to the wrap around care. As 4 Community Trust is an independent organisation, any queries about booking and payments will need to go through them please, not the main school office.

We really hope that you are pleased with this offer and it makes managing work and the school run that little bit easier.

Road Safety



Can parents and carers please be vigilant when crossing the roads. You are the one who will be with your children at the roadside every day. When you are out with your child you will have good opportunities to reinforce road safety messages. Please think about telling your child about the importance of finding safer places to cross, stopping behind the kerb, looking, listening, and thinking, holding their hands even if using a lollipop person or pedestrian facility. Making sure they have good visibility, taking their hoods down and no distractions with phones or friends when near roads. This will help your child to develop good road safety habits at an early age and reinforce your own road safety awareness.

Operation Encompass

St Martin's is part of Sandwell's Operation Encompass. This is an initiative that enhances communication between the police and schools where a child is at risk from domestic abuse.

Operation Encompass has been established to help schools provide in-school support to children who have been present at, exposed to or involved in any domestic abuse incident.

We know that children can be significantly harmed, physically and/or emotionally, during these situations, and that it also negatively affects their learning and behaviour in class.

Therefore, as part of the Operation Encompass procedure, and to help mitigate the resulting negative impact, school will now receive a confidential information from West Midlands Police or Children's Services regarding any child or young person has been witness to, or involved in, any reported domestic abuse incident.

Here at St Martin's, we have a dedicated and child-focussed Safeguarding Team. They are specially trained to effectively use the information the Police share, in confidence, and enable the school to provide the right support to any child and their family.

We always endeavour to offer the best support possible to our pupils and believe this will be extremely beneficial for all those involved.
